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School of Grace:

Reading: Romans 13:11-14; Matthew 21:1-9 see also Isaiah 60

Have you ever wondered why most people didn't accept Jesus as Messiah when he was on this earth?

Today we read the Old Testament and wonder how they could have missed it, but we are looking back. What if Jesus came today? Would we make the same mistakes?

Probably.

That is because we keep expecting a different 'messiah'. We want a messiah that justifies our positions. A messiah that frees us from our oppressors. A messiah that destroys our enemies. We want a messiah that accepts our 'light'. One that reinforces our position.

But Jesus never did that. The religious leaders all struggled to account for the life of Jesus. He didn't accept their authority. More than that, he criticized their beliefs and practices. Yet 'sinners' were profoundly drawn to Him. They had no authority. They had no status. Yet they were first on Jesus list.

The ones that hadn't read the scrolls. The ones who hadn't studied them at length. The ones who had now given up on the idea of a messiah. They couldn't save themselves. Why should someone else come?

The religious leaders had come to think that if humans became 'deserving' enough, then God might look favorably towards us, or at least look away from our 'bad'. But Jesus came precisely because we never deserved it. We never deserve forgiveness. We never deserve God. We never deserved God's sacrifice. God could see our sin. He wasn't the vengeful God sitting up waiting for us to fail. He already knew that we had failed. We couldn't even salvage a little bit of success.

Yet God looked at us. He didn't condemn us. He didn't destroy us in an instant. Instead he looked at us with eyes of love. He spoke words of forgiveness. He gave us Himself. Not just little pieces but his full life just for me. Just for you. We might have deserved God coming to visit to ask about our mistakes. To demand retribution. But to give us unconditional love even when we were at our very worst.

One of my favorite times of the day is the morning. If I have woken up early, one 'hears' the stillness outside. One sees light gradually come. You hear the birds start their songs for the day—one at a time. One feels content to simply stay in bed. To watch things unfold before your eyes. There is a calm tranquility that transcends peace. Eventually the sun gets up, and you hear those around getting up to start a new day. To go about the daily activities, following one's agenda and moving to a tight schedule.

Grace offers a new morning. Yesterday we had been doing all our activities. We had strived so hard for our dreams. We had tried to follow our plans but by the end of the day they had completely failed and a long, dark, cold night had ensued. We tried to sleep, hoping that if we wake up, we'll find it was all a dream. But sleep is impossible. We thought we were afraid of death. Now we find we are afraid of a failed life. We don't know what we are going to do the next day. There is nothing we can do. Even our best efforts won't make a dent in the cost we have to pay for yesterday.

It is then we find that God is right here. He wasn't concerned about our work. He was concerned about us all along. We find a new light breaking through. And we experience a new day—unlike anything we've ever see before. We are not rushing about. We are content in the new-found knowledge of God's unconditional love, of absolute grace, of perfect mercy.
